MACV is excited to share an update about our collaborations with other agencies combating homelessness in Minnesota. <u>YardHomes</u>, headquartered in New Brighton, builds prefabricated "tiny homes" for a variety of purposes. Their initiative to partner with area nonprofits, named Y-HELP, seeks to



address the affordable housing crisis by constructing accessory dwelling units, or ADUs, for individuals affected by housing instability.



# Partner Spotlight: Veteran Community Garden

MACV wants to recognize the wonderful partnership between our team in Southern Minnesota and the Veteran Community Garden established by Minnesota State's Southern Agricultural Center of Excellence. SMCA's Veterans in Ag initiative offers numerous avenues for engagement with older and younger Vets alike. One of their most recent projects, the Veteran Community Garden, showcases the working relationship between staff members like Program Coordinator Nathan Hanel and MACV Employment Specialist Mark Bullen.

The Garden, a 10x20 foot plot in Mankato by the Loyola school campus, operates in conjunction with South Central College. Mark Bullen explains, "It really reaches two groups.



Older Veterans can safely connect during COVID-19 while younger Vets can learn about working in ag." Working in agriculture goes way beyond farming. Transportation, food service, farm supplies, and other industries all play a role in the agricultural industry. The Veteran Community Garden serves as an entry point for Veterans who want to learn more about the possibilities awaiting them in the ag sector. Bullen explains, "Trainers have taught courses on natural pest control, we would bring Master Gardeners in to teach about various topics."



While the garden is open during limited hours, Mark hopes to see them extended soon so that working Veterans can more easily participate in the Garden's activities. We congratulate the Veterans Garden crew for such a solid beginning and look forward to years of collaboration ahead.

# MACV 101: Living Doubled Up

**Doubled up:** The Institute for Children, Poverty, and Homelessness explains, "Doubled up' refers to an individual or family who is unable to maintain independent housing and is forced to stay with friends or family members, often in overcrowded conditions." Common examples include a family sharing a bedroom in a relative's house, or an individual "couch surfing" at various friends' apartments while looking for their own place.

Are people living in a doubled-up household homeless? Depends on who you ask. HUD does not consider doubled up living homelessness. Most human service organizations and even other government agencies do consider it a form of homelessness. This disagreement may seem like a small technicality. However, it has very real impacts on the assistance available to people in doubled up living situations even though they have extreme housing and even personal safety instability.

**Who is most likely to be doubled up?** Certain groups are more likely to live doubled up. Single, low-income moms with limited education are the most common demographic seen in this arrangement. Certain cultural and ethnic groups are also more likely to have this arrangement, with Native American communities topping the list in Minnesota.

**How do we reach the "hidden homeless?"** Many of the ways we engage with people experiencing unsheltered homelessness are simply ineffective when working with doubled-up Veterans. General community awareness is the best way for families and other underserved households to learn about MACV and other homeless-focused services. Other human service organizations, churches, and schools can let people who are struggling know about us. Underserved groups like Native American communities also benefit from this approach, with personal experiences and testimonials playing a big role in building trust with MACV and our providers.

**Can I help doubled up Veterans?** Absolutely! One of the most powerful ways you can help is to simply talk about MACV at your next PTA meeting, American Legion event, or on social media. You never know who's listening!
